I read a post on social media the other day from a rescue explaining the current state of animal welfare across the country with higher numbers of surrenders, animals staying longer with the shelters and rescues, fewer transports, and fewer adoptions. The plea was to spay and neuter your pets, stop breeding, particularly of animals we see too many of already such as Pitbull type dogs, and provide training for pets already in your home. There is no single path to reducing pet overpopulation, nor is there a single reason for the problem or a single group or approach to tackling the problem. Animal welfare agencies have not always worked well together. Defining shelters/rescues as "kill" or "no kill" has created a divisiveness not only with each other but for the public who may not understand what those terms truly mean. Just like the problem, singularity will not solve the problem. At a time when there is so much division in society, animal welfare agencies are coming together to address the problem, supporting and encouraging each other. **Together we can get through this. Together we can make a difference.**

In our community, the city, county, shelters, and rescues have started a coalition to sit down and discuss the challenges, gain perspective for what others are going through, and looking at ways we, as a united group, can have a more positive impact on people and animals, and reduce the number of animals being euthanized. For everyone who has gotten up early to feed and clean, driven animals to spay/neuter, came in at night no matter the weather, a weekend or holiday, or fulfilled a last-minute plea for help with a vacant shift, you are part of the solution. Without our volunteers, fosters, and donors no amount of effort from members within the coalition would be enough. It is hard, dirty, tiring work. It is also one of the most rewarding and fulfilling experiences. Together we can continue to have a positive impact on the animals in our community, as well as the people who love them.

Do you have any pets?


I currently have two dogs, both LOHS alumni. Max and Gertie are both coonhounds and we love them so much.

In the last week of July, a remarkable event unfolded at the Lake Oconee Humane Society. Our dedicated Cat Manager, Dreama, in collaboration with our partners, orchestrated a rescue operation that saved the lives of 23 cats in just one week.

Of these 23 felines, a staggering 17 were rescued from a single partner, an open admission municipal shelter. The cats and kittens we welcomed ranged in age from as young as 3 weeks to as mature as 5 years old. Our new arrivals included mother cats with their kittens, orphaned babies, abandoned adults, and strays alike. Each one of them, regardless of their past, is highly adoptable and well worth the effort it took to accommodate them.

In order to make room for our new feline friends, we had to turn our cat rooms inside out. It was a monumental task, but one that we undertook with pride and honor. We believe that every life is precious, and we are committed to doing everything we can to provide these cats with a second chance at a happy life.

However, we cannot emphasize enough that our work is not possible without support. The importance of fostering and adopting cannot be overstated. At present, we heavily rely on our few but mighty cat fosters, almost on a rotating schedule. These individuals open their hearts and homes to our feline friends, providing them with a safe and nurturing environment until they find their forever homes.
