I am excited about this new opportunity and hope you will join me in welcoming him into the LOHS family. You may see him around from time to time until he joins us full-time in March.










ADOPTION RECAP

EMPLOYEE HIGHLIGHT: DR. ANDREW DUNCAN

We are thrilled to introduce Dr. Andrew Duncan as the newest member of the Lake Oconee Humane Society team! When asked to give a brief bio, Dr. Duncan wrote the following:

"I graduated from Ross University School of Veterinary Medicine in association with Auburn CVM in 2007. About a year and a half ago, I took a government job in Athens with the USDA and brought my wife, Brittany, and two sons, Joshua and Jonah, to downtown Greensboro.

Historically, we are cat people through and through. Last shelter job, we managed to collect 15. At that time, we cared for a community colony next door, set traps for TNR, and bottle-raised countless litters. Since that time, we have dwindled down to two. Moochie is the last of the original crew and Mewsabelle is 2 years old. In my career, I have worked in emergency, day practice, relief, government regulation, academics, and military veterinary medicine. Most of the past 16 years have been focused on High Volume/High Quality Spay Neuter (HV/HQ SN). I have five years of experience working in a non-profit shelter and an additional five years in a for-profit spay/neuter community practice. Throughout my career, I have experienced various disciplines of veterinary medicine and found that working at the shelter is both fulfilling and challenging. What drew me back to the shelter were the people and the distinct challenges shelters encounter. The employee and volunteer dynamic of a shelter is rare among other organizations. By virtue of their love for animals and selfless service, both employees and volunteers are some of the most compassionate and dedicated individuals that I have ever met. They strive to do a good job, go the extra mile, and are hungry to learn.



My appreciation and admiration cannot be overstated when I consider the steep challenges that shelters inherently face, and it is these challenges that I am excited to overcome as a member of the team. Since moving to town, I have volunteered with LOHS, providing medical support to adoption counselors on Saturday mornings. In my new role, I will help launch a HV/HQ SN program in the Lake Oconee community. Greensboro is ideally located to make a significant regional impact. Veterinary Services will also collaborate with animal welfare groups to offer basic preventive care and medical guidance."


