Starting on June 1st, Pet Preparedness Month begins and coincides with the first day of Hurricane Season. Having worked in animal disaster response for much of my career, I have seen firsthand the devastation in the aftermath of disasters. Sometimes these are small, localized events while others are felt across multiple states as we witnessed last year with Hurricane Helene.

"In 2024, the U.S. experienced 27 weather and climate disasters that resulted in at least \$1 billion in damage each. These events included severe storms, tropical cyclones, winter storms, flooding, droughts, and wildfires. The cumulative cost for these disasters was \$182.7 billion, making it the fourth highest on record, according to the NOAA National Centers for Environmental Information (NCEI)."

Disasters cannot be prevented, but being prepared for you, your family and your pets makes the response to and recovery from a disaster easier. Resources for planning and preparation are available at Ready.gov as well as any of the national animal welfare organizations' websites.

It is never too early, but it can be too late. Begin now to review your plan, put together your family To Go Kits, and stock up on the supplies you will need during a disaster. Make sure your pets are up to date on vaccines and if they aren't already microchipped consider getting them chipped. Collars and tags can come off; a microchip can be the difference in getting reunited with your pet.

Plan, Prepare and Stay safe!

Held on a pictureperfect spring day in Lake Country, the event drew more than 70 enthusiastic players and over 30 fans and volunteers, all rallying for a great cause.

Participants didn't just bring their paddles—they brought their hearts. Donations poured in for the shelter's dogs and cats, including much-needed food and supplies, along with over \$2,000 in monetary contributions.

ORHS volunteer Jeanine Parker was on site all day, accepting donations and keeping an eye on the real stars of the event—four-legged guests Rocky, Gemma, and Bear, all adoptable dogs who came to cheer from the sidelines. One lucky pup, Rocky, caught the eye of a tournament player and is now in the process of being adopted. With paperwork underway, it looks like Rocky has a forever home in his future.

Also in attendance was Ernie, Kelley Chitwood's dog who was recently adopted from ORHS. Ernie enjoyed greeting players and soaking up the love and attention from the pickleball crowd.

The tournament also sparked future commitments from several players who expressed interest in volunteering at the shelter.

Kelley Chitwood, Putnam Pickleball's dedicated ambassador, summed it up best: "We raised awareness about local pets that need homes. That makes it worth it all!"

HOW WE CAN HELP THE DOGS BECOME MORE ADOPTABLE

We all hope to see our LOHS dogs go to a loving forever home and by making every day a learning experience to 'be good' we will make our dogs more adoptable.

On an average day our dogs will meet and interact with around eight volunteers, so we have the opportunity to provide some basic training, together with mental and physical stimulation.

To provide continuity it would be most helpful if we are all on the same page.

Here are just a few of very many interactions we can adopt as a group of volunteers.

- 1. **SET THE TONE -** before opening the pen door "four paws on the floor" then open the door. The same applies to feeding a nice stand or even a sit before the bowl is placed on the floor.
- 2. **SET THE TONE -** for greeting, again only interact when four paws are on the floor, turn away until feet are on the floor then calmly praise and give affection.
- 3.**SET THE TONE -** before going out on a walk a nice stand for a treat or praise before opening the door so that you walk out together.

If we can start to adopt these three interactions, we should see positive results which will be extremely beneficial to all of our dogs, especially those who will be with us for many, many weeks.


