The Dog Pen

Recently, I had a volunteer ask for clarification regarding exercise restrictions for our dogs so I thought this might be a great opportunity to address that. When an animal is on limited activity or restricted exercise, the reason and duration (if applicable) is marked on the large whiteboard in the notes section. The whiteboard must always be checked prior to animal interaction for this very reason. Exercise is restricted for 7-10 days after spay or neuter surgeries, but again, those dates are written out on the whiteboard and then erased when no longer applicable. In cases where exercise restriction is required long term, like special medical cases or heartworm positive dogs, the whiteboard will simply say "restricted exercise". This means no running, jumping or playing. This is necessary to allow the animal time to recover form surgery, avoid reinjury, or in high positive heartworm cases - sudden death. When volunteers see "restricted exercise", that means the animal should only be out for potty breaks and socialization until they are healthy and well enough to resume normal physical activity. So, if you usually walk for blocks, go around the building, visit the pond, run, jump and play rough with your dog - it's too much! So, the biggest takeaway is to check the whiteboard before every interaction with every animal. As always, please reach out to the dog care team if you need any additional information.





Do you have any pets?


We have a very special cat! You might remember him Andy the escape artist. When I started volunteering at the




Focused on being a community resource for pet owners and on helping to keep pets in their loving homes
